Chapter 4 – Jnana Karma Sannyasa Yoga

Verse 7

Sanskrit Verse

Śhrī Bhagavān Uvācha:

Yadā yadā hi dharmasya glānir bhavati Bhārata |
Abhyutthānam adharmasya tadātmānam sṛjāmy
aham ॥7॥

Simple Meaning

Lord Krishna said:

O descendant of Bharata, whenever there is a decline in righteousness and a rise in unrighteousness in the world, at that time I manifest Myself.

Detailed Explanation

Lord Krishna Reveals the Purpose of His Divine Manifestation

In this verse, Lord Krishna explains when and why He manifests Himself in the world.





Whenever righteousness, truth, justice, and moral values decline, while unrighteousness and injustice begin to increase, the balance of the world is disturbed.

At such times, the Supreme Lord manifests Himself through His divine power to restore righteousness and guide living beings toward the path of dharma.

The Decline of Dharma

The word **dharma** refers to righteousness, truth, duty, moral conduct, and the principles that maintain harmony in individual and social life.

When people move away from truth, compassion, justice, self-discipline, and their righteous duties, dharma begins to decline.

Lord Krishna explains that such a decline in righteousness is one of the circumstances in which He manifests Himself.

The Rise of Adharma

Adharma means conduct that goes against righteousness and moral principles.

When injustice, cruelty, dishonesty, selfishness, oppression, and immoral behavior become increasingly powerful, adharma rises.



Lord Krishna assures Arjuna that when unrighteousness becomes dominant and threatens the balance of dharma, the Supreme Lord manifests Himself for a divine purpose.

Lord Krishna Appears Through His Divine Power

Lord Krishna's manifestation in the world is different from the ordinary birth of a living being.

As explained in the previous verse, the Lord is eternal and unborn. He does not appear in the world because of karma or material compulsion.

Instead, He manifests Himself through His own divine power according to His will and purpose.

The Difference Between Divine Manifestation and Ordinary Birth

Ordinary living beings take birth according to their previous actions and karmic consequences.

The Supreme Lord, however, is not bound by karma. His appearance is voluntary and divine.

Therefore, the manifestation of Lord Krishna should not be understood as an ordinary material birth. It is a divine appearance intended to fulfill a higher spiritual purpose.



Restoring Dharma in the World

One of the important purposes of the Lord's manifestation is to restore righteousness.

When dharma becomes weak, the Lord provides divine guidance and establishes the principles of truth and righteous conduct.

Through His teachings and divine actions, He shows humanity the importance of following the path of righteousness even during difficult circumstances.

Protection of the Moral and Spiritual Order

Dharma is not merely a set of external religious practices. It represents the moral and spiritual order that helps individuals and society live according to truth and higher principles.

When this order is seriously disturbed, the Lord's divine manifestation helps restore balance and reminds humanity of its spiritual responsibilities.

Connection with the Previous Verse

In Verse 6, Lord Krishna explained that although He is unborn, eternal, and the Supreme Lord of all beings, He manifests Himself through His own divine power.

Verse 7 now explains **when this divine manifestation takes place.**



Whenever there is a decline of dharma and an increase of adharma, the Lord manifests Himself. In the following verse, Krishna further explains the purposes of His divine appearance.

Jnana Karma Sannyasa Yoga in Practice

This verse also has an important message for everyday life.

The path of **Jnana Karma Sannyasa Yoga** encourages a seeker to perform their duties with spiritual understanding and without selfish attachment.

A person does not need to wait for external circumstances to change before following dharma. By practicing truthfulness, compassion, self-discipline, justice, and selfless action in daily life, an individual contributes to the preservation of righteousness.

Understanding this verse inspires a seeker to remain committed to dharma even when circumstances around them become difficult.

Profound Spiritual Meaning

The deeper message is that **when truth, righteousness, and spiritual values become weak,**



the divine principle of dharma is restored through the Supreme Lord's intervention and guidance. The Lord's manifestation is not caused by material necessity or karma but takes place through His own divine power.

This teaching also encourages human beings to recognize their own responsibility toward dharma. A person who follows truth, performs their duties sincerely, avoids selfishness, and acts for the welfare of others becomes an instrument in preserving righteousness.

By developing spiritual knowledge, performing selfless actions, and cultivating devotion to the Supreme, a seeker can remain steady on the path of dharma and gradually progress toward Self-realization and liberation.

Word-by-Word Meaning

Śhrī Bhagavān Uvācha – The Supreme Lord said

Yadā yadā – Whenever, whenever

Hi – Certainly, indeed

Dharmasya – Of righteousness

Glāniḥ – Decline, deterioration

Bhavati – Occurs, takes place



Bhārata – O descendant of Bharata, Arjuna

Abhyutthānam – Rise, increase

Adharmasya – Of unrighteousness

Tadā – Then, at that time

Ātmānam – Myself, My own divine form

Srijāmi – I manifest, I create

Aham – I

Message of the Verse
